From ECF President Jeff Williams



I continue to be amazed at the generosity in our community. One of the best examples is the Emporia Community Foundation which has grown in 28 years from the beginning fund of \$5,000 to the 350+ funds in the ECF today worth over \$37 million. The ECF Board approves new funds at our monthly meetings and one of the things that impresses me are the unique purposes and diversity of these funds to improve our community. Here are just a few funds making a real difference in the second quarter of this year:

- The *Team Schnak Strong Fund* paid the registration fees for 27 kids with Type I Diabetes (out of a total of 56 kids in the entire camp) for the statewide Type I Diabetes Camp this summer.
- The *Project Playscape Fund*, started by a group of Moms in Americus who wanted a decent place for their kids to play, funded playground equipment 12 years ago. They recently raised over \$550,000 for a first-class Baseball Complex and are now working on a community Splash Pad.
- The Lyon County Honor Flight Fund took another group of local veterans to Washington DC in April. Area veterans are selected and USD 252 Southern Lyon County high school students accompany them on the trip. Many of the veterans, especially from the Viet Nam era, never received honors once stateside or a warm welcome home. The Olpe Community goes all out for these trips of a lifetime. The next one is in November.
- The *Richard Porter Fund*, through the donation of soybeans to the ECF, has provided funding to the Kansas Legal Services to assist Kansans to expunge felony records so they can move on with their lives.
- An Anonymous Family Fund sent money to the United Way of the Plains for tornado relief victims in Andover and surrounding communities.
- The Kaltenbacher Charitable Trust Fund provided funding to the Chase County College Access Fund for scholarships for high school students taking college classes.
- And, the Cleve Cook/Emporia Lions Club Fund gave a generous check to Hetlinger Developmental Services for their greenhouse project.

The total of disbursements from just these seven funds was \$185,281. And, these are only a few of the payments sent out in the **second quarter** to make the greater Emporia community such a wonderful place to work, play and live.

The ECF is now focused on Flint Hills Legacy Funds. Flint Hills Legacy Funds allow for your assets to remain in your control during your lifetime, plus there may be significant tax savings. These funds can be modified with changing circumstances and benefit greater Emporia generations far into the future. Investing in the Community

The ECF Finance Committee met with UMB Bank on July 14th for their quarterly meeting. The ECF investments are down 13.59% for the year; however, it is better than the national average. UMB representatives went on to say that it has not been a good six months, but all things considered, our portfolio has done well. While the potential exists for a negative return for the calendar year, it should be better than the numbers seen at the end of June. The committee members were pleased to learn most of the ECF investments performed above the benchmarks.
