The Eighth Annual Emporia Area Match Day held on November 15, 2021, hosted 25 nonprofit organizations at the ECF office. The final total of \$455,703.96 in donations and matching funds was given out to the organizations on November 30th. This is a 29% increase over last year, making it the most successful year, to date. Since 2014, over \$1.8 million has been raised for groups participating in Match Day.

The 2021 Match Day committee was comprised of: Ruth Wheeler, Chair, Kay Lauer, Bill Barnes, Cynthia Kraft, Nancy Thomas, Patricia Saenz-Reyes, and Steve Kuhlman, along with numerous other volunteers the day of the event. The organizations were provided with a website to host their fund raising; Dave Leiker worked with all 25 groups to create videos highlighting their projects and passions; and KVOE met the organizations on Talk of Emporia.

Our awesome matching donors contributed \$60,000 to Match Day and we extend a huge thank you to the Clint Bowyer 79 Fund, the Jane and Bernard Reeble Endowed Foundation, the Trusler Foundation, the Preston Family Charitable Fund, the WS & EC Jones Testamentary Trust, Fred and Paula Neuer, and Nick and Jan Laurent.

Match Day's Growing Up Giving Program supported three schools this year. The USD 253 Village Elementary third to fifth grade were sponsored by Capitol Federal Foundation, Citizen's State Bank, Community National Bank & Trust, Emporia State Federal Credit Union, ESB Financial, and Lyon County State Bank. The Kaltenbacher NonEndowed Fund, an ECF Fund, sponsored three classes from Chase County Elementary School and the fifth grade from Sacred Heart Catholic Elementary School was sponsored by Gary and Beverly Post. The students studied the participating organizations during the week of November 1st, then made their choices. Each class was allocated \$100 and using math, debate and information gathered about participating organizations, divided up their money to their chosen nonprofit organizations.

KVOE broadcast the check presentation live on November 30, 2021, at the Flint Hills Mall. Chuck Samples and Becky Nurnberg talked about the missions, passions and goals of the participating organizations, then presented the checks to group representatives. Tears, laughter and surprise were all a part of the presentation as the groups were excited to put their donations to work, making the greater Emporia area such a great community. Many letters of thanks were sent to the matching donors, sponsors and everyone who contributed to the future of our area.

The 2022 Match Day Committee will meet in mid-February to finalize parameters for this year's event. Applications will follow with the participating organizations announced in the spring. Then, the work starts on building the 2022 Match Day on November 14th to be even bigger and better.

When asked to Chair the Emporia Area Match Day, I had no idea it would be such a huge rewarding project. It takes the entire ECF staff, board, and trustees to put on. Many thanks to everyone for their vision, philanthropy, and service to our greater Emporia community. Standing O for Becky, Loni, Mari, and Tommy!

EMPORIA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES 2022 GRANT RECIPIENTS

Seven non-profit organizations in the greater Emporia area will start 2022 on a much brighter note as the Emporia Community Foundation's (ECF) Grants Committee presents checks totaling \$25,000. The ECF Grants Committee, chaired by Jeff Williams, selected grants for innovative projects and programs that meet changing community needs in the area of health, social service, education, recreation and cultural affairs. "We are able to help people in communities served by the ECF," Williams said. "These grants help with various projects including recreation, nutrition, emergency housing, and education." The grant applications were submitted last September and the checks were awarded on January 26, 2022 at Family Promise.

ECF grant recipients this year are:

- \$2,300- City of Lebo Park and Recreation Board for safety and lighting for tennis and basketball courts;
- \$2,500 Communities in Schools of Mid-America to provide direct basic students' needs assistance (food, clothing, school supplies, and personal items);
- \$5,000 Family Promise of the Flint Hills to provide beds and 'welcome home' packs;
- \$5,500 Hartford Park Revitalization Project to replace picnic tables;
- \$3,500 Project Playscape for splashpad construction at Americus Jones Park;
- \$5,000 United Way to fund the Emergency Housing Project;
- \$1,200 USD #253-Logan Avenue for Sonday Let's Play Learn system.

The ECF Grants Committee is proud that they are able to support projects in the Greater Emporia Area. Funding for these grants comes from the fees ECF collects from maintaining funds. The amount collected is budgeted and approved by the ECF Board of Directors. Williams also encouraged people to set up a legacy fund for grants stating that it is regular folks who make a huge difference in our communities.
